

downscaling its operations until such time that it was required to remobilise again, we never expected for that time to come so quickly. The floods that have swept over Kwa-Zulu Natal, and parts of the Eastern Cape have left catastrophe in their wake, the only responsible course of action for the **Fund** is to support

government's call to remobilise and provide urgent humanitarian aid where required. This decision does not undermine the current work that is taking place to scale down the **Solidarity Fund's COVID response.** That work is underway, and all projects and programmes will be wound up by the end of **September**, as planned. Our **Surge vaccination outreach sites** are continuing to make vaccines accessible to all across the country. They have recently reached an impressive milestone, which we will talk more about later. The partnership between the

Humanitarian Crisis Relief Fund and National Empowerment Fund (NEF) is also concluding its work and it was gratifying to meet the faces behind the numbers on a recent site visit to affected businesses. **Tandi Nzimande**

A major consideration for the rapid **roll-out of vaccinations** across our vast country has always been accessibility, especially to the most vulnerable. To mitigate this challenge, the Fund, in partnership with the National Department of Health instigated the surge capacity outreach vaccination sites programme with the intention of making the vaccine easily available and taken to where people are, and reaching those living in outlying and rural areas. Currently the programme has cumulatively activated **280 sites** across all **9 provinces**. It has

administered 1,028,565 vaccinations as of the 18th of April 2022 which have been delivered


